GIVING THANKS AS A MARK OF TRUE CHRISTIAN

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As we approach thanksgiving holidays, let us pause to reflect the significance of thanksgiving in a true Christian life. For many, the extent of thanksgiving is limited to a one-time, get-it-out-of-the-way holiday that reminds them to reflect on how blessed they are. However, giving thanks to God is taught throughout the scripture in both Old and New Testaments. Each day should be a day of thanksgiving to God.

The Old Testament has various instances of **Sacrifice of Thanksgiving** to reflect gratitude. The Israelites sang a song of thanksgiving as they were delivered from Pharaoh's army after the crossing of the Red Sea (Exodus 15). God required all Israel to gather together three times each year (Exodus 23:14–16.) The very essence and purpose of these gatherings were praises and thanksgivings. The book of Psalms is composed mostly with the **Songs of Thanksgiving**, both for God's grace to the Israelites as a whole through His mighty deeds, as well as for His individual grace to each of us. Also, Psalms outlines the significance of thanksgiving in praise and worship (Psalms 136: 1, 100:1-5, 18:49, 26:7, 30: 4, 30:12, 35:18, 50:14 and so on).

In the New Testament, there are repeated admonitions to give thanks to God. Phil 4:6 and I Tim 2:1 exhorts us to make *Thanksgiving as an integral part of our prayers.* 1 Thes 5:18 teaches us *Thanksgiving as God's will and Gods command.* Eph 5: 19-20: encourages us to be thankful for everything in all circumstances or trials we go through. To have a thankful heart becomes a huge challenge when trials come. However, this is a time, which reveals our maturity in Christ. Job worships God in the midst of his tribulations. He 'blessed' the name of Yahweh (Job 1:21). That's a phenomenal demonstration of praise. Furthermore, we see Paul rejoicing in the prison (Phil 1:12-18). Whatever our circumstances, the Lord is still our hope and our comfort, God works everything for the good of those who love Him (Rom 8:28). As believers, our eternal hope is to secure no matter what is happening here on earth.

Lastly, *give thanks for who He is* (Revelation 11:17). If we do not praise and thank God for who He is (first and foremost), then we reduce God to the status of just a gift giver. We need to give thanks to our God Himself and for His sovereignty.

Thankfulness acknowledges God's sovereignty and glorifies God. God wants us to be thankful for His goodness, His mercy, and His truth. We have every reason to be thankful to God, especially for the eternal salvation from our sins and for the work of God in our life (Col 1:12-14). What a loving God we have. To choose to be thankful is to walk by faith and not by sight.
