We will live because Jesus lives; Wonderful assurance

There are people who put their hope, joy and confidence in their wealth and health live in a dream world. Some people are lazy while others are workaholics. We come across restless and dissatisfied people around us, at the same time, others live in affluence and disregard the life after death. Planning for retirement- preparing for life before death- is wise but neglecting the life after death is disastrous.

In the gospel of John Jesus used seven times the words "I am" to introduce who he was and to declare the purpose of his coming to the world. The fifth one is "I am the resurrection and the life." (Jn 11:25). We never find such a claim in the life of any religious, social or political leaders because they all are finite beings where Jesus is infinite. Several stories are reported in history for dead bodies are kept for days expecting a restoration. We trust in Jesus who is risen, the first fruit, then, those who belongs to him when he comes (1Cor 15:23).

The gospels contain abundant testimony to the resurrection of Christ. The book of Acts is a story of the apostles' proclamation of the resurrection of Christ. The epistles depend on the fact that Jesus is living, reigning savior who is now the exalted head of the church, who is to be trusted, worshiped and adored and will one day return in power and glory. The book of revelation repeatedly shows the risen Christ reigning in heaven and predicts his return to conquer his enemies.

Christ's resurrection ensures our regeneration (1Pet 1:3), our justification (Rom. 4:25) and a perfect resurrection bodies for us (2 Cor 4:14). Apart from above theological significance, we look at the ethical significance as well. Apostle Paul sees that resurrection has application to our obedience to God in this life. Be steadfast, immovable, always abounding in the work of the Lord, knowing that in the Lord your labor is not in vain because Christ was raised from the dead (1Cor 15:58).

We are encouraged to focus on the heavenly reward as our goal. The struggles our life will be repaid at the resurrection (1 Cor 15:17-19, 32: Colo. 3:1-4).

We have the obligation to stop yielding to sin in our life. We are to consider ourselves dead to sin and alive to God in Christ Jesus by virtue of the resurrection of Christ and his resurrection power within us (Rom 6:11). Because Jesus lives, we also will live.
