God's Intervention for Restoration, Revival and Renewal in 2021

The present generation raises questions, has God forgotten us or is He slow to act in history? The impatience of people results in pride and rebellion. Though Korah was swallowed by earth as a divine punishment, his descendants, tribe of Levites were appointed to serve the temple worship. Sons of Korah were responsible to cry out for God's intervention with expectation (Ps.85).

Israel had a long history of backsliding. When they rebelled, God punished them by sending invading enemies, famine, and pestilence. This time, the nation might have been experiencing a famine (v.12).

God's intervention for restoration:
Sons of Korah prayed for restoration (v.4).
Bible records a picture of the religious, moral,

and civil corruption in Israel. The book of judges describe that God raised twelve judges for delivering the people who were oppressed by others. Israel was restored on several occasions in history. When God restores, He brings people to repentance, He forgives their sins, and then He terminates the punishment that resulted from His indignation.

- God's intervention for revival. The Psalmist prayed unto God for a revival, "will you not revive us again" (v.6). Spiritual declension results in losing the joy in heart. The demonstration of God's unfailing love would revive the nation, church, family, and in personal life. True revival is always initiated by God's Spirit, not by human effort.
- God's intervention for Renewal. "The Lord will indeed give what is good, and our Land will yield its fruit" (v.12). The Lord withholds no good thing from those who walk uprightly (84:11). The more we first seek God's righteousness and His kingdom, the more we

will be taken care of by God (Matt. 6:25-33). The sudden disappearance of manna reminded the people of Israel that it was a gift from God. There was no longer any manna for them, but the Promised Land was ready for planting and harvesting (Joshua 5:10-12).

Our restoration, revival, and renewal are the acts of God. God's visitation and personal touch would turn around the situation. It was happened in the incarnation of Jesus, "the Word became flesh and dwelt among us" (Jn 1:14) resulted in spiritual harvest. Festival of Pentecost had an agricultural significance, but the day of Pentecost resulted in a great spiritual harvest all over the world (Acts of the Apostles). Let us welcome 2021 expecting great things from God. We shall overcome COVID-19!!!
