GREAT AND MIGHTY GOD, WORTHY OF PRAISE

Psalm 147 begins and ends with the awesome expression, "Praise the Lord". Though the date is uncertain, this psalm is probably written after the Babylonian exile. When they returned to Jerusalem it was appropriate to have genuine worship and trust in God. Israel as people of God was privileged to behold God's greatness and mighty power throughout history despite their constant backsliding. We recognize God's grace and greatness through Jesus Christ who redeemed us to live for His glory. Great is our Lord and mighty in strength (Ps.147:5).

The Lord builds up Jerusalem. A study on Ezra and Nehemiah reveals the fact that God makes things possible when we have a passion and dedication in unity with a vision to serve

the eternal purpose. Whereas the book of Ezra deals with the temple and worship, Nehemiah deals with the walls and everyday life. We find the sorrow of Nehemiah upon the desolation of Jerusalem but his prayerful dependence upon the Lord is very evident to finish the walls in 52 days. It is significant to acknowledge the hand of the Lord upon us for incredible provision and protection in any work as Nehemiah did in re-building the walls (Neh. 2:8).

The Lord restores the exiles of Israel. God wants His people to be in His perfect will and purpose. Israelites were in exile on several occasions due to their own pride and stubbornness. God was compassionate upon their cry and restored them to Jerusalem. We come across several instances on their return to Jerusalem as a fulfilment of prophesy (Ezek. 37:21-22). As people of God, we need to remember the role of Jesus Christ in restoring

us to advance for God's purpose as an individual, family and a church.

The Lord heals the broken hearted and binds the wounds. Nehemiah not only found the broken walls but the broken lives upon his arrival to Jerusalem. He took an initiative that they assemble before the Water Gate. People listened attentively to Ezra as he read God's word (the book of the law of Mosses) and their lives were changed. Reformation is not a closed chapter, it is an ongoing process to those who confess their sins and give right attention to the Word of God. The Lord heals us physically, emotionally and spiritually by sending His word in our life (Ps. 107:20). God knows us and sustains us for He is great and greatly to be praised.

The inability to understand God's greatness to its fullest may seem to create a void in understanding God completely. Therefore, to overcome this human limitation, the Bible

demands trust, hope, and unquestioning faith in God for Him to work.

The revelation of the past, present, and future to Moses enabled him to believe God and His powers. Knowing God's plans kept Moses on task to lead the Israelites. But the same intensity of trust and faith lacked among the followers. Their eyes were fixed on the human nature of Moses, and not on the greatness of God, who called them out of bondage.

When one understands the greatness and mightiness of God, the problems we face will be of minuscule. Once the revelation of His greatness is reconnoitered, our gratefulness, praise, and worship will be moved to a higher level. May we all say and meditate daily on the word Jehovah "El Shaddai" – God is our all-powerful and all-sufficient sustainer. This will

help us take up our daily struggles and overcome them effectively.
