Rooted In Christ

The Scripture in Psalms 1:3 compares a child of God to a tree that is planted by the riverbank. Examining a tree reveals that its vitality relies on the health of its roots; weak roots lead to a weak tree, a dull trunk, and withering leaves. This analogy highlights the significance of a strong foundation. Let's consider how a child of God can develop deep roots to become a sturdy tree.

1. Examine the condition of our hearts and take ownership of our current spiritual status.

The absorption of water and essential minerals from the soil is the primary function of roots, enabling the growth of trees. When a seed is planted, it aims to establish a taproot that reaches deep into the ground in search of water. Similarly, when we are planted by God, we also develop a taproot that seeks nourishment. It is crucial to determine whether this taproot is drawing sustenance from the Holy Spirit or from worldly influences. The depth to which roots can grow is also influenced by the texture and compactness of the soil. In loose and easily diggable soil, roots can penetrate deeper into the ground. However, in dense and hard soil, roots face a more challenging task as they struggle to push through the compacted layers. In Matthew chapter 13, good soil represents a receptive heart that can produce a fruitful harvest when the word of God is sown into it. Just like the good soil, our hearts need to be cultivated and prepared to receive the word of God, allowing it to take root and grow within us. We should assess whether our hearts are enriched with the word of God and the Holy Spirit or if they have become hardened and unyielding like hard soil.

2. You need to learn to place your trust and confidence in God.

Building a strong foundation in Christ is imperative for spiritual stability and growth, akin tohow a tree requires a well-developed root system for longevity and strong anchorage. Trusting God involves developing a close relationship with Him, like spending time with a best friend. By developing a personal and intimate relationship with God through prayer, meditation on His word, and consistent communication, to build a foundation of trust. In Jeremiah 17:7-8, it is emphasized that those who trust in the Lord and have confidence in Him are blessed, and they are like a tree planted by the water. This analogy signifies the importance of placing trust and confidence in God, as it leads to a fruitful life.

3. Being filled & anointed by the Holy spirit.

The scripture advises us to emulate a tree that is firmly rooted by the water and extends its roots towards the stream. The tree's roots naturally gravitate towards the nearest water source, seeking nourishment and sustenance. Therefore, I ask you, in which direction have your roots been growing? Are they deeply entangled in the

world's desires and temptations, or are they securely grounded in the word of God? The Holy Spirit serves as a constant counselor, offering guidance and strength. By seeking the Holy Spirit's counsel daily and prioritizing a connection with Him, individuals can navigate

life's challenges and maintain unwavering faith. To succeed in both worldly matters and spiritual growth, it is vital to be filled with the Holy Spirit daily. As we embark on the new year, may we strive to be like a tree deeply rooted in Christ. Regardless of the varying seasons that trees endure - summer, fall, winter, autumn, and spring - if we remain steadfast in our faith, establish our foundation in Christ and allow the Holy Spirit to nurture us, we will flourish and yield abundant fruit in due time.

In Matthew 7:13-14 Jesus himself says to choose the narrow gate because it's the path that leads to life.
